Year: 2






#### Life in the Ocean by Claire A. Nivola






#### Beneath the Waves by Helen Ahpornisri

**Year:** 2, 3, 4



**Year:** 5, 6



A colourful first information book about life under the sea for children just beginnning to read alone.




#### Pollution (Ecographs) by Izzi Howell

**Year:** EY, 1



Year: EY, Y1


